More Notes from Mr. Gable, our Regional Vice-President....

So many new varieties of irises have been brought into this area in the past few years through our Iris Auction that Twin City gardens and our Iris Show should soon show the results. There were hundreds of new varieties that most of us have never seen.

<u>Did You Know?</u> Elmohr is the only onco bred to win the Dykes Medal. Ola Kala and Daybreak tied for the Dykes Medal in 1946. Daybreak proved to be the biggest disappointment of all the contenders for the Dykes, never gaining a position better than 50th place in the Symposium and passed out of the 100 Favorite Irises after six more years. Ola Kala went on to win the Dykes in 1948, held 1st place five times and remains in 47th place in the 1961 Symposium.

Advice to New Hybridizers. Plan on fine stalks - good branching - substance (laced, crimped or ruffled as you prefer) - form - color. This is the order somewhat in relation to their importance. New hybridizers are apt to forget that branching and fine stalks come first. It usually takes eight years for amateur hybridizers to find this out by themselves. But the small plot hybridizers have to find it out before eight years, give it up or move to a bigger acreage. If I had the space to hybridize and grow seedlings, I would start with white and blue with Snow Flurry as my No.1 pod parent. For pollen parents, I would search the records of those A.M. winners, blue or white, having Snow Flurry in the parentage... The toughest job of all would be to produce a better red, but perhaps more rewarding if accomplished...For pink or rose, Mary Randall would be my pollen parent. Palomino is a good parent and fits in with either pink or yellow... Wide color crosses should be avoided other than blue on white or the reverse, rose on pink or pink on yellow or the reverse. Immediate results can best be expected by sticking to the solid colors and using the best available irises.

CONSTITUTION OF THE TWIN CITY IRIS SOCIETY

<u>ARTICLE I</u> (Name)

The name of the Society shall be The Twin City Iris Society.

ARTICLE II (Objectives)

The Society shall be a nonprofit organization whose object and purpose is to promote the culture and further improvement of Iris. The methods of obtaining this object may include:

- (a) The holding of annual shows and formal visits to gardens
- (b) The stimulation and support of Civic beautification plantings.
- (c) The collection of photographs, lantern slides and the collection and distribution of data concerning the history, classification, breeding, cultivation and exhibition of Iris.
- (d) The Twin City Iris Society shall be affiliated with the American Iris Society and the Minnesota Horticultural Society.

ARTICLE III (Officers)

- Section 1. The officers of the Society shall consist of a President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Historian and Corresponding Secretary.
- Section 2. There shall be elected to a Board of Directors, six (6) directors at large.
- Section 3. In an advisory capacity only past presidents of the Society may attend joint meetings of the Board of Directors and Presidency as long as they are members of the Society. They shall, however, have no power to vote at such meetings.

ARTICLE IV (Membership)

The membership of this Society shall be classified into five groups as herein after defined:

- (a) Charter Membership shall consist of the original organization members who have paid the initial fee of Five (\$5.00) Dollars.
- (b) Active Membership shall consist of all persons residing in the State of Minnesota who are interested in the culture, breeding and/or exhibition of Iris, who pay annual dues which are determined by the Board of Directors. Present dues for individual membership are Two (\$2.00) Dollars per annum; for family membership Two-Fifty (\$2.50) Dollars.
- (c) Life Membership shall be granted to any individual upon the recommendation of the President and Board of Directors and upon the payment of a fee of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars.
- (d) Subscribing Membership shall consist of persons residing in any State other than Minnesota. They shall pay dues in the same amount and shall be entitled to the same privileges as the regular active membership.
- (e) Honorary Membership may be conferred by the Society upon recommendation of the President and Board of Directors, upon persons who have rendered distinguished service to the knowledge and development of the Iris. Honorary members shall not be required to pay dues and they shall not hold office or vote.

ARTICLE V (Meetings and Conventions)

- Section 1. The Twin City Iris Society shall hold an annual exhibition during flowering season. The place and date to be determined by the exhibition committee or committees.
- Section 2. The Annual Convention to be held in October at which time officers will be elected and such other business as is deemed necessary transacted.
- Section 3. Twelve members being present shall constitute a quorum.
- Section 4. The members of the Society shall be called to meet upon five or more occasions each year other than the annual convention and exhibition. The program of these meetings shall be directed along lines which will further the object and purpose of the Society.

ARTICLE V (Meetings and Conventions) Cont'd

- Section 5. Special meetings may be called by the President upon request of a majority of the Board of Directors.
- ection 6. The President shall call all meetings of the Board of Directors. A majority of the elected board members being present shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VI (Funds)

The funds of the Society shall be derived from the payment of dues, gifts or from such other projects as may be authorized by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII (Officers)

- Section 1. All officers shall be elected for one year except the directors who shall be elected for two years.
- Section 2. The President shall appoint a nominating committee of three members at least one month before the annual meeting. At the annual meeting this committee shall present at least two nominations for each office to be filled.
- Section 3. All newly elected officers shall assume the authority and duties of their respective offices as of January 1st following their election.
- Section 4. Each retiring officer shall before the succeeding January 1st deliver to his successor all books, records and properties belonging to that office.
- Section 5. No President shall succeed himself more than once.

<u>ARTICLE VIII</u> (Duties of Officers)

- Section 1. The President shall arrange for and preside at all meetings and conventions of the Twin City Iris Society, appoint all standing and special committees, have general supervisory & executive authority over all activities authorized by the Board of Directors.
- Section 2. In the absence or inability of the President to act the First Vice President shall act and in his absence or inability to act the Second Vice President shall act.
- Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep minutes of all meetings or conventions of the Twin City Iris Society, shall have charge of all papers pertaining to that office, shall keep on file a correct list of all members and shall keep a correct list of all officers and members of committees of the organization.
- Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall perform the duties of that office according to its requirements, keeping full records of such transactions.
- Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and be the custodian of all the funds belonging to the Twin City Iris Society, provide safe keeping of them by depositing same in a reputable bank in the name of the Society and Treasurer; pay all bills approved by presidential or vice-presidential authorization. The President or Vice President shall co-sign all disbursements with the Treasurer, turn over all books and records annually to an auditing committee appointed by the Board of Directors, this committee to make a full report at the annual convention.

ARTICLE IX (Parliamentary Authority)

Roberts Rules of Order revised shall be the authority where not in conflict with or where this constitution and by-laws are silent.

ARTICLE X (Amendments)

This Constitution may be amended at any annual convention by a two-thirds vote provided that a copy of the amendment shall have been presented in writing to the President or Board of Directors at least thirty days prior, and to the entire membership at least fifteen days prior to the annual convention.
