# PRESIDENT'S LETTER

This month I will have to forego my usual ramblings in favor of more important matters. Since our annual dinner meeting in October, your 1962 and 1963 officers and directors have met in a joint session for the purpose of considering certain changes for the forthcoming year. The decisions which they reached have resulted in two important announcements of concern to all of our members.

The first has to do with the names of members to be included in our 1963 year book. This has always presented a problem for our editors because the year book is compiled at the beginning of the year, but some of our folks forget to pay their dues and

renew their memberships until several months later, with the result that some active names have been omitted and some inactive ones included. Your officers and directors have decided to establish the January meeting as a deadline date. All members whose dues are paid by that date will automatically be included. Those who find it impossible or inconvenient to pay their dues by that time may still be included if they notify our year book editor, Mrs. Mary Haertsen. But whether you pay your dues or notify Mary Haertsen, please be sure that we have your correct name, address and telephone number so that the year book will be accurate and up to date.

The second announcement concerns our new schedule of dues. In accordance with your approval as expressed at the October meeting, we are making a moderate increase of 50¢ a membership. The annual dues, including both the Twin City Iris Society and the Minnesota State Horticultural Society, will be \$3.00 for an individual or \$3.50 for a family. The dues for membership in the Iris Society alone will be \$1.50 for an individual or \$2.00 for a family.

Before dropping the subject of dues, I can't pass up this opportunity to get in a plug for the Minnesota State Horticultural Society, our parent organization. Our Iris Society is an affiliate of Hort, and our presidents are automatically members of its executive board. Being devoted to the promotion of all branches of horticulture here in Minnesota, its interests are identical with ours, and it deserves our complete support. All members receive its fine publication, The Minnesota Horticulturist, issued nine times a year and written specifically for Minnesota gardeners with their own peculiar problems. The regular cost of membership is \$2.00, but in conjunction with Iris Society membership it is only \$1.50. I recommend in all sincerity that all of our members who do not already belong to Hort avail themselves of it.
