#### VARIETAL COMMENT - Mr. G. B. Gable

I have been asked to comment on some of the newer varieties of iris for News & Views, so I will mention only those varieties that are outstanding as to color, size & performance.

ANYTIME was not a pure white but it fascinated me with its substance and the wide, wide standards and falls and its strong stalk. The flowers took the sun for two or three days without folding, getting whiter each day. One of the largest iris in the garden.

CAPTAIN GALLANT gets my vote for the best red to date but Victor Hardkopf's seedling, RED CHIEFTAIN X CALDRON, may have it beat if not branched too high. I am waiting to make a comparison this year. THE MAD HATTER and BANG are two other so-called reds that have lots of size & height to go with good performance.

CELESTIAL SNOW, to my way of thinking, is the finest pure white in my garden. I like its ruffling. It has everything. Bro. Charles has produced some of our best iris - CELESTIAL BLUE, ORCHID JEWELL, MISSION ROSE, CELESTIAL GLORY and others. You will hear a lot about CELESTIAL GLORY, a very large orange-apricot with a fiery red beard. MISSION ROSE is very similar to MARY RANDALL but in my garden it is larger & produces more flowers than MARY RANDALL.

The performance of some irises may be so poor the first year that we may wonder why they were introduced. MELODRAMA, TOAST 'N HONEY, VALIMAR and GLITTERING AMBER came to my mind and I am sure there are many more. I thought I could never like an iris with open standards until last year after a rain when GLITTERING AMBER stood up like a soldier. With its open standards it was a massive flower with carrying power that could be spotted from a distance. VALIMAR with its large flower had that rich, golden apricot tint on pink that I am unable to describe. MELODRAMA and TOAST 'N HONEY came thru like pictured in color catalogs.

BROADWAY STAR, KING'S CHOICE, ROSE GARLAND, FULL REWARD and VIOLET HARMONY are easy growers and produce giant flowers.

CASHMERE with its red beard and large ruffled rose flowers was outstanding.

LOVELY LETTY, a bright violet, was another with a fiery red beard.

RIPPLING WATERS is a very lacy blend of blue, orchid and cream with a tangerine beard. So many of the new varieties have this red or tangerine beard that I presume MARY RANDALL has been used a lot by the hybridizers. If an iris doesn't have a red beard or lace or ruffles or flaring falls it really has to be good to get attention.

ORIENTAL PEARL is my choice of all the pinks and there are many good ones. SWEET-HEART and LYNN HALL for near true color, also PINK CONFECTION. SPRING FESTIVAL, FLEETA, SPRING CHARM, VALIMAR and JUNE MEREDETH are others with loads of quality.

So many good yellows to choose from that it is difficult to make a choice. Last year SUNNYDALE drew my attention. The year before it was TECHNY CHIMES. With GOLDEN GARLAND, GARDEN GOLD, CHINESE LANTERN, WAXING MOON, GOLDEN HAWK and CELESTIAL SUNLIGHT, anyone could be a winner.

I believe that BLUE POWDER has more ruffles than any other blue but the flowers bloom too close to the stalk. GALILEE was the most perfect ruffled light blue and it was in competition with such beauties as SPRING VALLEY, LADY ROGERS, LADY ILSE, BLUE SAPPHIRE, ELEANOR'S PRIDE and SEAMASTER.

Last year CONCORD RIVER and IRISH EYES were one year plants, but they really had the color.

Last year so many of the blacks were below par that BLACK HILLS out-performed the entire lot. DARK BOATMAN for the first time put on a good show. BLACK SWAN was the most outstanding and BLACK ONYX on one year plants was really pretty.

ALLEGIANCE, a very dark blue, repeated as an outstanding performer for the second ear in my garden. The flowers last for days and it bloomed over such a long period. I like its strong stalk. It really deserves twelfth place in the 100 best.

Space will not permit comment on all the new and outstanding varieties. KNIGHTHOOD, DEMETRIA, EDENITE, FLAME KISS, PRETTY CAROL, POET'S DREAM, IRMA MELROSE, ROSY VEIL, CHINQUAPIN, DOTTED SWISS, ORANGE BANNER, APRICOT DANCER, PRETTY GAY, PATIENCE, VIOLET HAVEN, OYSTER PEARL, THE CITADEL, PATRICIAN, FROST AND FLAME and a host of others performed beautifully and are all excellent varieties. With 57 new varieties to look forward to this year, it should be an exciting bloom season.
