Some notes from Mrs. Wright, our hybridizing chairman:

(We wish we could have sent these out to you in time for your use this past season — but save them for next season and as you study hybridizing this year you will know what varieties to get next year — and will probably add some of your own.)

Good iris can only come from good parents. Two of the top parents over the years have been Snow Flurry — white, and Chivalry — blue. I will list a number of iris that have proved to be good parents. This, of course, is only partial and is only a beginning. Many beautiful iris are either sterile (producing no pollen) or set seeds very seldom, if at all. It is well to know these so that your time will not be wasted on these. These inexpensive iris are within the reach of all and have proved to be good parents:
